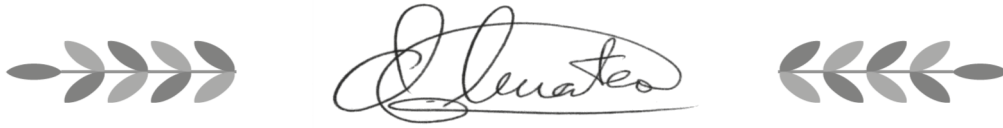

WORDS FROM OUR PASTOR / PALABRAS DE NUESTRO PASTOR



Like the wisemen, we too are on a journey during our lifetime. A New Year begins and we continue our search for the fullness of life, which is promised to each of us in the birth of Christ. Jesus is the light that shatters all darkness, all doubt, and confusion, and certainly gives us a sense of who we are and what we are called to be.

All of us search for meaning and purpose in our lives. We begin a New Year with a hope that things will be better, that the future will bring the satisfaction and happiness our hearts long for. There always seems to be something more that will complete and fulfill all of our dreams. We are all restless. But it is only God that can satisfy the longings of the human heart. 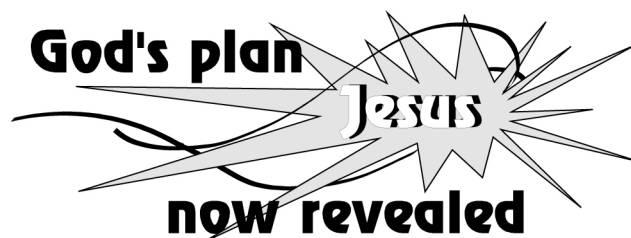

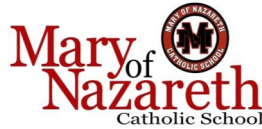

QUESTION: Why is Mass celebrated on Sunday rather than Saturday, the Jewish Sabbath day?

ANSWER: We know that the third of the Ten Commandments requires us to keep holy the Sabbath, which is the seventh day of the week: Saturday in our calendar. (Interestingly, the word Sabbath can be seen in the name for Saturday found in many languages.) However, Christians do not worship on the Sabbath Day, but on the "Lord's Day," Sunday. Why is this?

For the Jewish people, the Sabbath rest fell on the seventh day of the week, echoing the rest that God took on the seventh day of Creation (Ex 20:11). On this day, work was prohibited and the day was set aside for worship of God.

With the coming of Christ and the development of the Christian Church, worship moved from the Sabbath Day to Sunday. Sunday is associated with Jesus's resurrection and becomes the day of worship, as each Mass is a "little Easter." Within the New Testament, we see that worship on the Sabbath is no longer considered obligatory for Christians (Col 2:16) and that worship among Christians commonly takes place, instead, on Sunday (Acts 20:7, 1 Cor 16:2). Other early Christian writers also affirm this shift (cf. *Didache*; Ignatius of Antioch, *Letter to the Magnesians*). It was not that the Sabbath day had moved from Saturday to Sunday, but rather the law of Christ "requires you to keep the Sabbath constantly" (St. Justin Martyr, *Dialogue with Trypho*). Further, St. Justin explains, "But Sunday is the day on which we all hold our common assembly, because it is the first day on which God, having wrought a change in the darkness and matter, made the world; and Jesus Christ our Savior on the same day rose from the dead" (St. Justin Martyr, *First Apology*).

As we gather to worship each week, we do so remembering the Lord's resurrection – his triumph over sin and death – and we seek to experience that resurrection weekly and even daily as he heals the wounds in our lives. We keep the Sabbath alive constantly, not only understood as a single day, but also as a perpetual awareness of God's presence.

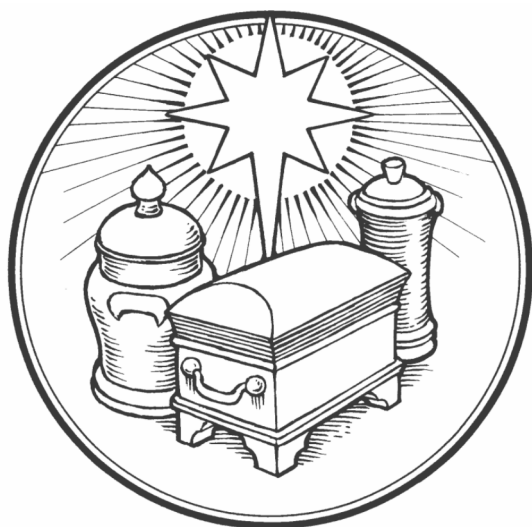
