SHARING THE JOURNEY - KEEPING FAMILIES TOGETHER AS A PRO-LIFE ISSUE

Friday, March 2, 6:00pm, Woodlands Room

This evening includes a soup supper, a presentation by Fr. Jacek Orzechowski, OFM from Catholic Charities, and a personal testimony of a catechist at the Catholic Community of Langley Park whose family is facing a perilous future due to the termination of the Temporary Protected Status (TPS). Catholic Church in our region, and point out unique opportunities that Montgomery County residents have to defend the vulnerable, promote justice and nurture the culture of life through local community organizing efforts such as AIM and the archdiocesan Justice and Advocacy Council. Fr. Jacek Orzechowski, OFM was born and grew up in Poland. After immigrating to the U.S. in 1988, he joined Franciscan Friars of Holy Name Province and obtained a Master of Divinity degree from Washington Theological Union. He served as a Parochial Vicar at St. Camillus Church in Silver Spring for the past nine years. He now serves at Catholic Charities, coordinating its Parish Community Organizing and Advocacy efforts.

WORDS FROM OUR PASTOR / PALABRAS DE NUESTRO PASTOR

There are many people who have never had an experience of God in their lives. Maybe it is because they look at life as a problem to be solved, rather than a mystery to be lived. Maybe they are just too busy getting ahead, making money and spending it. Maybe they are just too satisfied with things as they are, and do not want change of any kind.

Today, we hear about the transfiguration of the Lord. Jesus takes His friends, Peter, James and John, up a high mountain. There He is transfigured before their eyes. It was a peak experience for them. They began to realize and accept what Jesus was all about, that He would suffer, die and rise on the third day. Peter for the first time was speechless. Now, they knew; through suffering and death, through failure there is new life, the promise of salvation. We think of Jesus' transfiguration as a triumph of glory, but there is more. Jesus accepted His ultimate failure, His death on a cross. For Him the two went hand in hand: first death and then glory.

When His family thought He had lost His mind, He found some new friends. When the hometown people rejected His words, He went off to other towns. When those people refused to accept what He said and who He was, they turned Him over to the Romans to be crucified. He then went "home" to His Father. Jesus learned obedience from the things He suffered.

It would be good for us if we learned obedience by accepting the hard facts of life from the things we suffer. It would be good if we learned to accept failure as a necessary part of life instead of being surprised by it or trying to find some easy solution. But we will never come to terms with these lesser failures until we recognize and accept the failure of death.

All of us know that sooner or later we are going to die. But we pretend that it won't happen for a long time. We separate death from life itself. Each year brings us closer to the grave. We are frightened of death and try to make something eternal. Love is forever we say and it is. But sometimes it isn't. Maybe it wasn't love after all. Maybe love just died.

We like to think that our children will comfort us in our old age, that they will carry on our name and all that we had worked for. And they should, but sometimes they don't. Maybe it is not their fault. It is because all of us are orphans and strangers born out of due time into a world of mystery.

Children like to think their parents are perfect. And they ought to be. But sometimes they are not. It is not because they don't want to be but just because no one is. When we bury our parents, we recognize their humanness along with their love, and we decide to love them all the more.

All of us know that life is good, beautiful and precious. However, we need to also realize that life's failures are just as important as all of our successes. But there is something sacred and timeless, something that never fails. Our God takes all of our failures in hand and makes them whole. To experience and know His presence in our failures gives us the courage to go on.

We learn obedience from the things we suffer along the way. We learn how to die to our selfishness and sin and finally let go and leave the mystery of life to our loving God. That is how we are transformed into the likeness of the one we profess to love.

Hay muchas personas que nunca han tenido una experiencia de Dios en sus vidas. Tal vez sea porque consideran que la vida es un problema que hay que resolver y no un misterio para vivir. Tal vez están demasiado ocupados para salir adelante, ganar dinero y gastarlo. Tal vez están demasiado satisfechos con las cosas como están y no quieren ningún tipo de cambio.

Hoy escuchamos acerca de la transfiguración del Señor. Jesús lleva a sus amigos, Pedro, Santiago y Juan, a una montaña alta. Allí Él se transfiguró ante sus ojos. Fue una experiencia máxima para ellos. Comenzaron a darse cuenta y aceptar lo que Jesús era, que sufriría, moriría y resucitaría al tercer día. Peter por primera vez se quedó sin palabras. Ahora, ellos sabían; a través del sufrimiento y la muerte, a través del fracaso hay vida nueva, la promesa de la salvación. Pensamos en la transfiguración de Jesús como un triunfo de la gloria, pero hay más. Jesús aceptó su fracaso final, su muerte en una cruz. Para él los dos iban de la mano: primero la muerte y luego la gloria.

Cuando su familia pensó que había perdido la razón, se encontró con nuevos amigos. Cuando la gente de la ciudad natal rechazó Sus palabras, se fue a otras ciudades. Cuando esas personas se negaron a aceptar lo que Él dijo y quién era, lo entregaron a los romanos para que lo crucificaran. Luego se fue "a casa" a Su Padre. Jesús aprendió la obediencia de las cosas que sufrió.

También sería bueno para nosotros si aprendiéramos la obediencia al aceptar los hechos duros de la vida a partir de las cosas que sufrimos. Sería bueno si aprendiéramos a aceptar el fracaso como una parte necesaria de la vida en lugar de sorprendernos o tratar de encontrar una solución fácil. Pero nunca llegaremos a un acuerdo con estas fallas menores hasta que reconozcamos y aceptemos el fracaso de la muerte.

Todos sabemos que tarde o temprano vamos a morir. Pero pretendemos que no sucederá por un largo tiempo. Separamos la muerte de la vida misma. Cada año nos acerca a la tumba. Tenemos miedo a la muerte e intentamos hacer algo eterno. El amor es para siempre lo decimos y lo es. Pero a veces no lo es. Tal vez no era amor después de todo. Quizás el amor acaba de morir.

Nos gusta pensar que nuestros hijos nos consolarán en nuestra vejez, que continuarán con nuestro nombre y todo lo que hemos trabajado. Y deberían, pero a veces no. Tal vez no es su culpa. Es porque todos nosotros somos huérfanos y extraños nacidos fuera de tiempo en un mundo de misterio.

A los niños les gusta pensar que sus padres son perfectos. Y deberían ser. Pero a veces no lo son. No es porque no quieran ser sino porque nadie lo es. Cuando enterramos a nuestros padres, reconocemos su humanidad junto con su amor y decidimos amarlos aún más.

Todos sabemos que la vida es buena, bella y preciosa. Sin embargo, también debemos darnos cuenta de que los fallos de la vida son tan importantes como todos nuestros éxitos. Pero hay algo sagrado y atemporal, algo que nunca falla. Nuestro Dios toma todos nuestros fallos en la mano y los hace completos. Experimentar y conocer su presencia en nuestros fracasos nos da el coraje para seguir.

Aprendemos la obediencia de las cosas que sufrimos en el camino. Aprendemos cómo morir a nuestro egoísmo y pecado y finalmente dejamos ir el misterio de la vida a nuestro Dios amoroso. Eso es como tú y yo somos transformados a la semejanza de aquel a quien profesamos amar.

THE RITE OF ELECTION

A number of our adults and teens have been preparing for the reception of sacraments at the Easter Vigil through the process called the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA). RCIA is designed for adults and children of catechetical age who, after hearing the mystery of Christ proclaimed, conscious and freely seek the living God and enter the way of faith and conversion as the Holy Spirit opens their hearts. By God's help they will be strengthened spiritually during their preparation and at the proper time will receive the sacraments fruitfully. The initiation of catechumens is a gradual process that takes place within the community of the faithful. This journey includes not only the periods for making inquiry and for maturing... but also the steps marking the catechumens' progress, as they pass from one stage to the next in the process of becoming a Christian. Last week we celebrated the Rite of Sending in anticipation for The Rite of Election, which is celebrated this Sunday at the Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, with others from around the archdiocese. This is the second step in the process and is celebrated at the beginning of Lent. It marks the beginning of the final period of preparation, the time of purification and enlightenment. This is a more intense spiritual preparation in anticipation of the celebration of the sacraments of initiation at the Easter Vigil. Please keep our elect (formerly known as catechumens) and candidates in prayer through this intense period of preparation.

QUESTION: Why did Jesus have to die to save us from our sins?

ANSWER: The question of how the sacrificial death of Jesus can save us from our sins has vexed thinkers throughout the ages. *That* Jesus' death on the cross effects our salvation is a truth affirmed by the Catholic faith and articulated in the Nicene Creed. But *how* Jesus' death saves us is not defined explicitly. For a sense of the problem, one can read Fr. Jacques Servais' interview with Pope Benedict (25 October 2015) in which the pope discusses the challenges presented by St. Anselm's theory of the meaning of the cross.

The question, however, is not entirely fruitless. There are at least two important things that can be said about atonement and the cross. The first thing is that, at the last supper, Jesus intimately connects his coming death on the cross and the Jewish Passover sacrifice. There is something deep within us that feels the necessity of repairing damage after doing something wrong or after hurting someone. Often, there is an instinctive desire to give something – a small sacrificial gift – to the person who was hurt in order to show our sorrow and heal theirs. Although God has no need of sacrificial animals, the offering of something of value to God functions as a symbol of our sorrow. The sacrificial offering, in turn, actually serves as medicine for the soul of the one offering the sacrifice. As such, Jesus, becomes humanity's ultimate sacrifice for sin. This is why the Mass is seen as an "unbloodied sacrifice."

The second dimension to consider is that of love. When Jesus hangs on the cross and, later, "descends into hell," he enters into the limits of "God forsakenness." He enters into the realm of pain and suffering and brings love to that place. To love is to sacrifice oneself: "to will the good of the other as other." When we work for the true good of another, especially when it costs us, we participate in Christ's cross and cooperate in repairing the wounds of sin in our lives.
